KCCA, Kitebi SS partner on standards

Kampala Capital City Authority (KCCA) and Kitebi Secondary School have entered a new era of collaboration aimed at raising education standards, improving school governance, and addressing long-standing infrastructural challenges.

This renewed partnership was sealed during a high-level engagement between KCCA executive director Sharifah Buzeki and Kitebi Secondary School headteacher Muhammed Kamulegeya, who jointly committed to steering the school towards growth and excellence.

Despite the achievements, the headteacher pointed out the school's heavy financial burden.

With only 49 staff on the government payroll and fees averaging shr78,000, Kitebi SS relies heavily on internal funds to operate, including spending over shroom monthly on salaries for nongovernment staff.

Such pressures, he said, are often
