

Mount St Mary's College Namagunga has launched a major fundraising drive aimed at raising sh6b for the construction of a state-of-the-art classroom block.

The campaign was launched at a fundraising dinner held at Hotel Africana in Kampala on Thursday, December 4 (2025). The function attracted a large number of stakeholders, including parents, alumni, students, staff, well-wishers and development partners.

The school headteacher, Rev. Sr. Regina Nabawanuka, said the current student population of 1,250 had far exceeded the capacity of the existing infrastructure, hence the need for the proposed building. She said the new complex will include classrooms, a staff room, a library and computer laboratories.

She encouraged stakeholders to support the project, just as the school founder, Mother Mary Kevin Kearney of the Franciscan Missionary Sisters for Africa, had done. She said although the founder arrived with almost nothing, her deep faith and commitment to educating the girl child enabled her to establish the
