

Nagaba needs a liver transplant

James Nagaba, from age three, suffered persistent abdominal pain, nausea, loss of appetite and was underweight. He was taken to several medical facilities and misdiagnosed to have chronic ulcers, of which the doctors advised that he be given pain killers, which he lived on for close to one year.

This, with time, instead worsened the situation. His father, David Tibekyinga, was later referred to a gastroenterologist, who, after observing Nagaba, advised that he be taken to Mengo Hospital in Kampala for a liver biopsy. The results showed that Nagaba had liver duct paucity syndrome (parenchyma liver disease). It was also discovered that his liver was not producing enough bile.

Nagaba, now aged seven, has been using monthly supplements to temporarily manage the condition. It was advised by specialists



that the long-term solution that can improve Nagaba's health is a liver transplant. This procedure will be done in India at an estimated cost of sh155m. Tibekyinga is kindly seeking financial support from donors and well-wishers to make it possible for his child to live a long and healthy life.

Kisakye was rescued from mentally sick mother

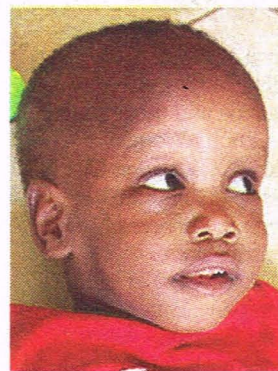

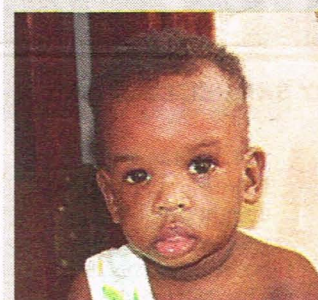
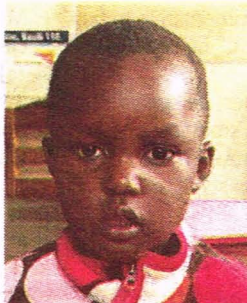

Authorities transferred her to Nsambya Babies Home for adequate care. To help link Namatovu to her relatives, call **0781725766**.



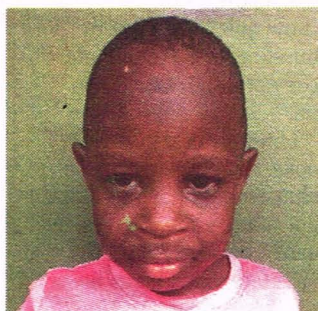
Dumped by mother
