Over 500 single and teenage mothers in Buyende district were full of smiles as they received household items worth sh100m on Women's Day, courtesy of Naamala Women's Empowerment Charity (NWECC), a non-governmental organisation that was founded by Dora Namaala, a staff member of Vision Group.

The beneficiaries received soap, food, clothes, footwear, menstrual pads, Maama Kits, mosquito nets, handbags, match boxes and mineral water.

A 14-year-old teenage mother identified as Namaganda from Kiseege village in Buyende town council could not hide her excitement about the items.

"Since I delivered, no one has ever given me soap, not even my baby's father," Namaganda, who missed last year's Primary Leaving Examinations due to pregnancy, said. Her dream was to become a nurse.

She said her boyfriend abandoned her for fear of being arrested by the Police. "It is my parents who take care of me. They are the ones that bought the baby clothes, medicine and soap," she said.

Another 16-year-old mother of twins, identified as Babiryé, hailed the charity for the support, saying that the donation had added value to her babies' lives.

"With this support, I will be able to take care of my babies for a while," she said. Aisha Nachola, a 35-year-old single mother and secretary of Sitika Single Mothers' Foundation (SSMF) in Kagulu sub-county, thanked NWECC facilitators who

arrived in the area a week before the event and skilled teenage mothers in catering, soap-making, hairdressing and baking. "The skills will help us to fight poverty," Nachola said.

HOW NWECC STARTED

Founded by Namaala, a Bukedde TV presenter, NWECC is a charity that seeks to empower vulnerable women and their children. Namaala said in her 28-year career as a journalist at Vision Group, she always encountered stories of vulnerable women and children, which made her think about changing the situation.

She said the idea to support child and single mothers was born 15 years ago. "I heard a number of bad testimonies. That forced me to start working towards helping vulnerable people," Namaala said.

She urged women to fight for their rights, noting that they can also be part of the nation's decision making.

"Giving birth is not a curse. A child mother can become a responsible citizen," Namaala said.
