**KAMPALA.** After a sensational opening weekend that saw 43 goals scored, the 2026 Primary Schools Futsal League returns to Twinbrook International School Kiteezi this weekend for its second matchday. Young players from across Kampala and beyond are eager to build on their first-week performances, bringing attacking flair, skill, and youthful energy to the court once again.

This year's edition comes after the league was piloted in 2024 to test the concept of a primary schools futsal competition. The pilot showcased the potential of young players and offered a glimpse into what structured youth futsal could achieve in Uganda. However, the league was not held in 2025, giving FAU time to strengthen its framework and expand participation for this

year. Twinbrook, a hub for young talent Twinbrook International School is equipped with a dedicated futsal facility, providing a high-quality venue for the league.

FAU Chairman Hamzah Jjunju said that primary schools must benefit from putting up game infrastructure that nurtures talent from a young age.

This term, the league will feature

Twawil Islamic, Twinbrook Skilling and Academy Centre, Twinbrook Elementary School, and Twinbrook DIT Centre. The league schedule is designed to give pupils maximum exposure, with six games per week over three days during a term, typically spread across three consecutive Saturdays.

Jjunju also revealed plans to develop Twinbrook into a futsal hub for chil-

dren aged six to 14, where structured training and competitive opportunities will be available not just during term time, but also during holidays for academies and individual players.

"Our vision is to create a home for young players where they can train, compete and grow their skills all year round, whether during school terms or holidays," Jjunju said.

### Goalfest

The opening weekend delivered an exciting mix of high-scoring encounters and tight matches. Twinbrook Elementary School set the pace with comprehensive victories, defeating Twawil 8-1, Twinbrook Skills and Academy 9-1, and Twinbrook DIT Centre 6-4. Twawil Islamic School and Twinbrook Skills and Academy played to a 1-1 draw, while Twawil Islamic School also claimed a 5-2 win over Twinbrook DIT Centre. Twinbrook Skills and Academy matched that 5-2 score line against Twinbrook DIT Centre.

Twinbrook Elementary School sits comfortably at the top of the standings with nine points and a goal difference of plus 17. Twinbrook Skills and Academy and Twawil Islamic School are level on four points. Twinbrook DIT Centre is yet to open its account, with zero points and a minus 16 goal difference.

### League structure

The league follows a structured progression through school grades and age groups. Term one will focus on P7 pupils, who are 13 years old, while term two will involve P6 pupils aged 12, and term three will cater to P5 pupils who are 10 and 11 years old. At the end of the year, the overall winner of the league will be declared.
